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THE GREAT OUTDOORS

The **GFWC Woman's Club of Vista**

(CA) was "Inspired by Nature." Their environmental education program brought children outdoors to learn about the environment and gardening through monthly classes. The children got their hands dirty while their minds were busily learning about bugs and Monarch butterflies, Earth Day, Water Wonderland, Fall Fun, and Pond Ecology.



ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

The **GFWC Women's Club of Odessa** (DE) held a forestry project with a goal to educate students about the importance of trees in reducing global warming and providing clean air by planting trees and revitalizing Arbor Day. Volunteers from the club worked with school administration, teachers, students, families, friends, and workers with disabilities. The students learned through active participation about the benefits of trees in the community.



NATURE

The **GFWC Solon Women's Club** (IA) made themed backpacks for children and families to check out from the library. The backpacks encouraged outdoor exploration with themes of birds, bugs, butterflies, spiders, and reptiles, and were filled with coloring books, crayons, magnifying glasses, toys, stickers, measuring tapes, binoculars, and activities.



RECYCLING WITH A PURPOSE

The **GFWC Paradise Valley Woman's Club** (AZ) and **DeQuincy Study Club** (LA) collected plastic grocery bags which were then crocheted into Mats for the Homeless and donated to a local group for distribution. It takes about 700-800 bags to make one of these blankets or mats.

IDEAS

Program ideas are endless. Below is a list of ideas on how clubs may support the Conservation Community Service Program.

- Educate young people about the importance of protecting our natural resources.
- Invite local experts and members of community organizations to speak at club meetings about conservation and beautification practices.
- Write op-ed pieces, letters to the editor, and press releases about important conservation issues in your community and submit them to your local media.
- Plant native species for beautification and restoration of land and waterways.
- Clean up along roadways, waterways, and trails.
- Implement beautification projects at parks, hospitals, shelters, cemeteries, and other community gathering places.
- Clean up trash after youth and adult sport and community events.
- Encourage preservation of historic properties.
- Visit a state or national park.
- Tour a botanical garden.
- · Honor individuals and businesses for their gardens and civic pride with a "Garden of the Month" project.
- Plant and care for trees and donate funds for reforestation plans.
- Create community gardens to promote self-sufficiency.
- Advocate and investigate local food and where it comes from.
- Preserve natural habitats to protect wildlife.
- Provide local shelters and sanctuaries with needed items for animal rehabilitation and care.
- Support curbside recycling programs, utilize drop-off and buy-back recycling centers, or organize a recycling program if none exist.

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- Work with local officials and organizations to facilitate proper disposal of unused medicine and needles.
- Participate and/or volunteer at a local household hazardous waste collection day event.
- Visit a landfill and discover the waste disposal practices which are in place to protect the land, air, and water.
- Implement energy conservation practices in your clubhouse, home, office, and public buildings.
- Investigate renewable energy projects and sources in your area.
- Participate in an awareness day such as Arbor Day, America Recycles Day, Earth Day, etc.

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AWARDS

GFWC recognizes State Federations for outstanding projects and clubs for creative projects in implementing effective Conservation Community Service Program projects and partnership projects, as follows:

- Certificate to one State Federation in each membership category
- \$50 award to one club in the nation for project creativity

Award winners will be determined by entries into the Awards Program. Each State Federation may submit one State Award Cover Sheet and one Club Creativity Award Entry Cover Sheet for the Conservation Community Service Program projects. Clubs do not submit entries directly to GFWC.
